


Exposition and Opening the Gates

- Homework for the day before you start your poetry unit:
- Who's your favrourite poet or What is your favourite poem?
- Ask someone in your household too. A mother, father, sibling, host mother, step parent...anyone.
- Next day: Ask each student and write their responses on the white board. "I don't have one" or "My parents don't read poetry" is a perfectly acceptable response. Just gather and share what you can.
- Have students take a photo before they leave.

Exposing Students to Poetry so they have a starting point.

- 1. As you hash this out, you will notice high engagement
- 2. International poems welcome!
- Accepting of all: OPEN THE GATES
- 4. This is a transference of passion and appreciation
- So important to write up YOURS
- 6. When students are asked to bring a printed copy of their favourite poem (many of them will not have one), they now have a starting point for their research.








Poem of the day

Emulation Poem

- 1. Print a copy of your favourite poem. *Use the photo from our first day as a starting point for research if you don't have one. And yes, song lyrics count as poems!
- 2. Annotate. Note poetic devices, stanza breaks, repetition, and other stylistic techniques.
- Emulate the STYLE of your favourite poem, but write your own.
- Same style, original content.
- Format side by side.

Emulation Poem









You are going to write a poem in the style of your favourite poem!

Step 1: Print a copy of your favourite poem.

Step 2: Annotate it! Note all poetic devices, stanza breaks, repetition, and other stylist techniques.

Step 3: Emulating (copying) the STYLE of your favourite poem, write your own poem!

Poem criteria:

Must be at least 10 lines. *This may require your doubling the stanzas of your original poem if it's short, or reducing the stanzas if your poem is long.

Must be in the same style as the original. For example, you may need to copy the structure of short lines or ABA rhyme scheme or ending each stanza with a metaphor, etc.

Must contain your own original words and content.

Please have your favourite poem on a column of your page and your original to the right in another column. You may format on MS Word or write by hand in ink.

Metaphor: The Mother of All Poetic Devices

Practice, practice, practice. Share, Share, Share.

 Metaphor- a metaphor states that one this IS another. Often, a metaphor compares something abstract (a feeling) with something concrete (an object). A metaphor, unlike a simile, does not use the word like or as.

Read the following examples and underling the two things being compared.

1. It's a good thing she got rid of her cheating boyfriend. He was a snake.

Qualities of the boyfriend?

2. "Art washes away, from the soul, the dust of everyday life."


Poetry Cafe
