



My song and dance for English 10 students


Before spring break, students select their 5-week (11-14 classes) genre unit.


Other options last year: Sports Commentating; Screenwriting; Graphic novel writing.

For our last visit, the kindies come to Brentwood to play, have a scavenger hunt, eat snacks and receive books from their heroes: their Big Buddies.


What do you do during the other days?


Learn about kids and impacts of the pandemic on child development.

:) Considerations

Scheduling All English 10 classes happen in the same two blocks, so the unit is student choice.

Class size My class is dictated by kindergarten class size.

Time 6 kindie visits is minimal (vs Collingwood all year).

Ages Grade 10s are mature enough to be focused and responsible big buddies; they know it's all about the kindie.

:) Considerations:

Partnership: The kindergarten teachers have been reliable, organized and positive partners.

Budget: My school supports the cost of the unit (paper, envelopes, card stock, big stapler, laminating sheets, colouring supplies, glue sticks, bus x 10 round trips).

Popularity of KidLit = the course has become a priority.

:(Considerations:

Conflicts We are a very busy school. The unit is interrupted by sports, G10 out-trips, Wellness Day, AP exams.

 It could happen in the winter term, but then we lose the magic of outside play, and the kindies are more prepared for the unit in the spring.

Why I do this unit every year

Magic of buddy relationships: almost always clicks; long-lasting impact on both ends.

Seeing the Grade 10s stepping up with empathy and astonishing capacity for patience.

Introducing/reminding my students of positive feedback loop of service.

Introducing/reminding my students of diversity in our community: language; socio-economics; family structure; race; physical, emotional, developmental abilities.

Unexpected: Syrian family and 1.5 years lunchtime volunteering outcome for two Libyan students.

Unexpected: students who were buddies in kindie now buddies in G10.
